Hot Dog Sale Charity Information

Money raised from the hot dog sale will go towards each year groups selected charity as explained below:

Dogs for Good

Year 3 will be raising money to sponsor a puppy to become a fully trained autism dog.

A Dog's for Good autism assistance dog gives the parent and child real independence and provides a safer environment for the child so they feel more secure. Having unlimited access to public places with the dog enables the whole family to do simple things such as shopping, which may have been impossible before. The dog wears a special harness that connects it to both parent and child and the dog acts on instructions from the parent while the child is encouraged to walk alongside the dog.

The UN Refugee Agency

Year 4 will be raising money to support the UN Refugee Agency

Only half of all children forced to flee their homes have access to any primary education and many of them miss out on years of schooling. With your support, UNHCR can help more refugee children access quality education, giving them the skills they need to build better futures for themselves and their communities. From training teachers and providing learning materials to building safe, accessible learning spaces, we aim to give all young refugees a chance to learn. Without education, an entire generation is at risk.

Year 5 will be raising money to sponsor an endangered animal such as the polar bear.

Polar bears populate the annual arctic sea ice in northern Canada, Greenland, Norway, and Russia. Between late April and mid-July, polar bears hunt ringed and bearded seals on the sea ice. With adult males weighing up to 1,430 pounds and growing as much as nine feet in length, they are the world's largest terrestrial carnivores. As a result of climate change, sea ice is melting earlier and forming later each year, leaving polar bears less time to hunt. As their ice habitat shrinks, skinnier and hungrier bears face a grave challenge to their survival.

Guide Dogs

Year 6 will be raising money to sponsor a puppy to become a fully trained guide dog for a blind or partially sighted person.

There are over 4,950 guide dog owners in the UK. For people who are blind or partially sighted, a guide dog could change their life.

A guide dog is trained to:

Walk centrally along the pavement whilst avoiding obstacles on the route

Not to turn corners unless told to do so

To stop at kerbs and steps

To find doors, crossings and places which are visited regularly

To judge height and width so the person does not bump their head or shoulder

To guide them across the road.
